Resources for Seniors (RFS) serves older adults, adults with disabilities and their caregivers in Wake County, North Carolina, by providing home and community-based services and information so they can maximize their choices for comfort, safety, security and well-being. We are a private, non-profit agency and serve as the County Council on Aging for Wake County. The services that we provide include:

Our Adult Day Centers, called **Total Life Centers** (TLCs), provide activities and care for adults of all ages who require supervision during the day. Each location has a regular schedule of activities, crafts, entertainment, and socialization. Locations are Cary, Garner, Raleigh, and Wendell. ADULT DAY PROGRAMS

Adult day programs, also called adult day services, provide an organized day program of socialization and activities, in a safe, supervised, community group setting. These services can be a beneficial resource for caregivers who are working or who could use time off from caregiving. Different models are available, depending on the level of care required. The amount of days a participant attends per week or month can vary according to preferences and needs. Arrange site visits at several locations to find the best fit.

Types of Adult Day Programs

- Social adult day programs (social model or adult day care) promote participants' social, physical, and emotional well-being through a structured program of activities. Staff provide supervision and assistance to participants as needed. A nutritious meal and snacks, as appropriate to the program, are also provided.
- Adult day health programs (health/social model or combination model) provide similar activities as social programs and also have a nurse present for at least 4 hours per day. This allows them to accommodate the needs of participants who may have chronic or more complex medical conditions.
- **Group respite programs** may be staffed by volunteers, and are intended to give caregivers an occasional short break. They are often not equipped to meet the needs of those with complex needs.

Paying for an Adult Day Program

Adult day program fees are typically quoted per day, and vary according to the amount of assistance a participant requires. In Wake County, a typical rate is \$45 to \$95 per day. Standard Medicare does not cover adult day program attendance. In some cases sliding scale fees, scholarships, or grant money may be available to help towards the cost of attendance.

ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE, DEMENTIA, AND MEMORY LOSS

The normal aging process can bring about many changes, including occasional forgetfulness, but memory loss that significantly disrupts everyday functioning and decision-making is **not** a normal part of aging. It is important to have possible causes of memory loss assessed with a complete medical and psychosocial assessment, as some causes are treatable and reversible. Medication reactions or interactions, depression, nutritional deficiencies, and many different diseases (not just dementia) can cause memory problems.

Dementia is a severe, pervasive loss of mental abilities such as memory, language, and reasoning. There are several different types of dementia, which can present with different symptoms and at different stages of life. **Alzheimer's Disease** is the most common type of dementia seen in older adults. This disease causes gradual but significant changes in the brain resulting in loss of short-term memory (the ability to remember new things) and issues with behavior, reasoning, and thinking. 

CARE MANAGEMENT

A care manager, typically a social worker or nurse with experience working with older adults and/or adults with disabilities, is familiar with local resources and can evaluate needs and then recommend, implement, and monitor services to meet those needs. They can communicate with a client's physician, and accompany a client to medical appointments, to make sure that recommendations are understood and carried out. They can also report back to a client's family on a regular basis. The following resources are all fee-based (and there is no financial assistance available).

When choosing a care manager, consider professional training, experience, and knowledge of local resources and government programs. There is no single standard credential or licensing for care managers, though there are several organizations offering certifications. Ask for references from previous clients.

Housing Counseling and Mortgage Default Counseling

Mortgage Default Counseling, or Foreclosure Prevention Counseling, is for homeowners who are struggling to make their mortgage payments. Nonprofit counseling agencies that are approved by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) can help homeowners in this situation get back on track by exploring their options, negotiating with lenders, and taking advantage of government and lender-sponsored programs to modify mortgage terms. This counseling is free because it is funded by government grants. If you are in trouble with your mortgage, contact a housing counseling agency as soon as possible. Do not be taken in by phone calls, mailings, or television ads from companies who demand money up front to help you modify your mortgage. Such companies are only interested in their own profit, not in helping you.

Reverse Mortgages

Reverse mortgages are loans designed specifically for older homeowners. They allow a homeowner to borrow against the value of their home without requiring a monthly payment. The loan can remain in place, without any payments, until the homeowner leaves the home permanently. To be eligible, a borrower must be over age 62, live in their home, and have a substantial amount of equity in the home.

The most common reverse mortgage is the federally-insured Home Equity Conversion Mortgage (HECM), which is offered by many lending institutions nationwide. Loan amounts typically range from 40% to 70% of the value of the home, with older homeowners being eligible for higher loan amounts. If there is an existing mortgage or home equity loan it must be refinanced with the reverse mortgage or paid off by other means. Once prior liens are satisfied, and closing costs are covered, the HECM loan can provide monthly loan advances to supplement the borrower's income, an available line of credit for future use, or a combination of both. The money can be spent for any purpose, with no restrictions. The homeowner retains ownership of the property and remains responsible for taxes, insurance, and maintenance.

A reverse mortgage should not be confused with a standard home equity loan or line of credit (HELOC), where the homeowner must make monthly payments. Reverse mortgages require no payments at all until the last borrower dies, sells, or otherwise leaves the home permanently. At that time, the borrower or their estate must pay back the loan in full. The title remains in the borrower's name unless the home is sold, and the lender does not "get" the house when the borrower dies.

If you are interested in applying for a reverse mortgage, contact a HUD-approved reverse mortgage counseling agency. Homeowners are required to receive counseling, in person or via telephone, before applying for a reverse mortgage. 

PROGRAM OF ALL-INCLUSIVE CARE FOR THE ELDERLY (PACE)

Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE) provides community-based care for adults ages 55 and older who have significant or chronic medical needs and meet state requirements for a specific skilled level of care, but want to remain living at home and are safely able to do so. A PACE participant receives comprehensive care for their health and social needs through the program, coordinated by a multidisciplinary care team. Services can include primary and specialty medical care, prescription medications, adult day services at their center in Durham, home care services, mental health and social services, skilled therapies, and nursing home and hospital care. PACE services are paid for by Medicare, Medicaid, and/or private payment. Senior CommUnity Care of NC is the approved PACE provider for Wake County.

HOME CARE

If you or a loved one needs help at home, start by thinking about two questions: what kind of services do we need? And, how will we pay for services? If you don't know the answers, read the following:

Types of Home Care Services

- Companion services are appropriate for those who need some help or supervision but are are able to manage their own personal care. Services can include meal preparation, laundry, errands, light housekeeping, and other "hands off" tasks. Companions may also assist with transportation, but not always. See Home Care and Companion Services on page 26 (look for listings marked with 11).
- Home care services are appropriate for those who need assistance with personal care or other activities of daily living (ADLs), which can include assistance with bathing, dressing, walking, eating, and toileting. Care is provided by certified nursing assistants (CNAs), also called home care aides or personal care aides, who have received training to provide "hands-on" assistance. Services may also include meal preparation, light housekeeping, etc., as long as assistance with ADLs is needed. See Home Care and Companion Services on page 26 (look for listings marked with).
- Skilled services, also called home health care, may be needed following a serious illness, injury, or hospitalization. Services can include physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, medical social services, and skilled nursing. Services may also include assistance with ADLs, as long as skilled services are needed. See Skilled Services on page 30. (For private duty nursing, see Home Care and Companion Services on page 26 and look for listings marked with •).
- Respite care refers to services that allow family caregivers to take a break from providing care. Respite may be provided through companion services or home care services, through a community-based program such as an adult day program (see *page 1*), or via a short-term facility stay, depending on an individual's needs. The term "respite" is broad and can refer to ongoing help or a short-term break.

Paying for Home Care

It is a common misconception that Medicare covers the cost of home care services. In general, home care services are not considered a medical service, so are typically not covered by Medicare, and companion services are never covered by Medicare. Paying privately is the most common option for people needing these support services to stay at home. In Wake County a typical private pay rate is \$16-\$25 per hour for companion services, \$18-\$30 for home care services, and \$40+ per hour for private duty nursing. Skilled services (home health care) may be Medicare-eligible. For more information on programs that can help provide home care services, read below:

Medicare

- The **Medicare home health benefit** pays for *limited skilled services* following certain illnesses and injuries, only if the following criteria are met: (1) The patient needs intermittent skilled services; (2) The patient is homebound; (3) The care is ordered by and under the direction of a physician; (4) The agency providing care is certified for Medicare visits (like those on *page 27*). Services are usually provided only on a short-term basis. For more information contact the physician of the person needing care.
- One exception to Medicare typically not covering home care services is that some Medicare
 Advantage plans and Supplemental (Medigap) insurance policies are starting to include coverage of
 some home care services. For more information call your plan provider (if there is coverage of home care
 services, be sure to ask how services are authorized and what exactly is covered).

Medicaid

- NC Medicaid beneficiaries may receive up to 80 hours per month of home care services under the Medicaid Personal Care Services (Medicaid PCS) program. To receive this benefit the Medicaid beneficiary's physician must submit a referral form to request an assessment, and the assessment must show: (1) The applicant requires hands-on assistance with multiple activities of daily living; (2) The applicant is medically stable; and (3) A household member is not able to assist. The number of service hours is determined via the assessment. If approved, the applicant can choose a provider from an approved list of agencies. For more information contact Liberty Healthcare Corporation (see page 59).
- The Community Alternatives Program for Disabled Adults (CAP/DA) is a Medicaid waiver program for adults ages 18 and older who have low income and assets and who are at risk of nursing home placement because of their care needs. People do not need to already have Medicaid to apply. For more information see the CAP/DA section on page 31.

Other

- VA Benefits: Wartime veterans and their spouses may be eligible for the VA Aid and Attendance or Housebound benefits, which can be used for home care or facility-based care. For more information see page 68.
- Other insurances: Some private insurance plans and long-term care insurance policies cover some home care services. Policies vary; for more information call your insurance provider.
- **Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE):** PACE is a community-based managed care program for adults ages 55 and older that can include some in-home services. For more information see **page 24**.
- Subsidized home care services: Resources for Seniors administers public funding for programs that provide limited home care services at subsidized rates for Wake County residents who have no caregiver or whose caregivers need a break (respite) from caregiving. These programs have long waitlists. For more information call Resources for Seniors.

COMMUNITY ALTERNATIVES PROGRAM FOR DISABLED ADULTS (CAP/DA)

The Community Alternatives Program for Disabled Adults (CAP/DA) is a statewide Medicaid waiver program for adults ages 18 and older who have low income and assets and who are at risk of nursing home placement. Services can include in-home care, nursing services, adult day services, medical supplies, and case management. This program does not provide 24-hour care, so in most cases the individual must have family or other supports in place to supplement the care provided. There is a waitlist for CAP/DA.

To be eligible: (1) Applicants must meet Medicaid financial requirements (they do not need to already be a NC Medicaid beneficiary to apply); (2) Applicants must be certified by a physician as needing a nursing home level of care; and (3) The cost of providing care in the home must be determined to be less than the cost of institutional care. If services are approved, the applicant can choose an agency to provide services or can designate an individual to be their caregiver.

Resources for Seniors is one of the lead agencies for CAP/DA in Wake County.

HOSPICE AND PALLIATIVE CARE

Hospice care is for people who have life-limiting illnesses, often determined as a life expectancy of six months or less. It involves a team of professionals, including doctors, nurses, home health aides, social workers, counselors, and volunteers, who work with the patient and family to provide holistic care aimed at relieving symptoms such as pain and anxiety. Care can be provided in a private home, long-term care facility, hospital, or inpatient hospice facility. Hospice services are covered by Medicare Part A, Medicaid, and most private insurances. Some hospice providers accept patients regardless of their ability to pay. The Medicare hospice benefit can include medical care, home nursing visits, prescriptions related to the life-limiting illness, medical equipment and supplies, some in-home aide services, patient and family support, and more.

Palliative care also focuses on the comfort of the patient, but it does not require a limited life expectancy. Palliative services are covered by Medicare Part B, Medicaid, and most private insurances.

HOUSING OPTIONS

This section focuses on independent living options. See the Long-Term Care Facilities section for information on care facility housing options that provide substantial assistance with activities of daily living.

Active Adult Communities

An Active Adult Community is a housing development with homes for purchase that is often marketed to adults 55 and older who can live independently. These communities frequently have extra amenities designed to appeal to active retirees, such as planned activities and recreational facilities which may include community pools, walking trails, golf courses, health clubs, etc. Additional services may be available for additional cost. Active adult communities may offer a variety of dwellings, such as freestanding homes, town homes, patio or cluster homes, and condominiums. Homes are typically designed with an emphasis on qualities such as accessibility and low maintenance, and yard work may be included in the community fees. These homes are often moderately-sized, to appeal to homeowners who no longer need a large house for a growing family. Consult a realtor for details. Some communities may have new homes available; others have resale homes only. Active Adult Communities accept private pay only (no public assistance or subsidy is available).

Continuing Care Retirement Communities

Continuing Care Retirement Communities (CCRCs) (also called Life Care Communities or Life Plan Communities) offer a full range of living arrangements, from independent living to skilled nursing care, in the same community. This allows residents to remain living within the same community as their needs change. In most cases residents need to be able to function independently at the time of admission. CCRCs provide activities, meals, housekeeping, transportation, and health-related services for their residents. Depending on the nature of the contract these services may be included in a monthly fee or purchased as needed. Fees vary for different levels of accommodations and services. CCRCs usually require substantial entrance fees in addition to monthly fees. In some communities the entrance fees are partially refundable depending on length of stay; in others a residence is purchased at the time of entrance into the community and the resident



has equity in the home as an owner rather than a tenant. CCRCs primarily accept private pay (no public assistance or subsidy is available).

Rental Retirement Communities

Rental retirement communities offer independent living in apartments or cottages with meals available in a common dining room. Other services, including housekeeping, linen service, activities, and transportation, may also be available. Some have optional care services available upon request, or licensed assisted living units, as noted below. Most communities are for adults ages 55 and older. Monthly fees vary with the type of accommodations and the level of services chosen. Fees can vary from around \$1,500 to over \$5,000 per month. Rental retirement communities primarily accept private pay (no public assistance or subsidy is available).

Subsidized and Affordable Housing

Subsidized and affordable independent living housing options have eligibility based on income. An applicant's income must be below a set limit in order to qualify. These limits can vary by complex, but are typically 40%-60% of the area median income, which changes yearly. As of April 2021, 60% of area median income in Wake County is income of \$40,200 per year for a 1-person household and \$45,960 per year for a 2-person household. *Some complexes have lower eligibility limits. Some complexes are for seniors only, so have a minimum age requirement. Other properties are open to people of all ages.

Subsidized housing has rents that are based on a percentage of income, usually 30% after allowing for certain deductions. A government subsidy pays the rest of the rental cost. Most **public housing** is subsidized.

Affordable housing, also called tax credit properties, have rents that are typically lower than market rate because the developer received a tax credit. These rents may be the same for all residents or there may be two or more levels, or tiers, of rental pricing depending on income. For affordable housing there is often a minimum income level requirement as well as a maximum.

Please note: The demand for subsidized and affordable housing in Wake County exceeds the supply. Most complexes have waiting lists of a year or more.

HOUSING-RELATED PROGRAMS

Home Adaptation and Accessibility

Accessibility aids, such as grab bars and ramps, **home modifications**, such as widening doorways, and **specialized equipment**, such as stair lifts, are all examples of adaptations that can help seniors and disabled adults remain living safely in their own homes. Some of these things are only available via private pay (out-of-pocket), while for others there may be programs to assist low-income seniors. If you're interested in considering adaptation and accessibility modifications or devices, ask your doctor or occupational therapist for suggestions, or look online for ideas and options. AARP's HomeFit Guide is one helpful resource:

When hiring a private contractor for an accessibility project yourself, here are some tips:

- Be sure to get at least three qualified estimates to compare.
- Some professionals pursue a **Certified Aging-in-Place Specialist (CAPS)** designation, developed by the National Association of Home Builders (NAHB) and AARP, which consists of training specific to the needs of home modifications for aging adults. To find local CAPS-designated professionals you can call the NAHB at 800-368-5242 go online to **www.nahb.org/other/comsumer-resources**.
- Ask contractors about their experience with the particular type of job you're requesting, as well as about licensing, liability, and workers compensation insurance.



- For any state-licensed trade(s) (general contracting, electrical, plumbing, etc.) you can call the NC licensing board for that trade to inquire about licensed contractors' history to see if any complaints have been filed.
- Never pay more than a 50% deposit for projects and only pay the balance after the work has been completed to your satisfaction.

Weatherization Assistance Program

The Weatherization Assistance Program is a federally-funded program aimed at improving energy efficiency for low-income homeowners, so their homes can be heated and cooled more easily and less expensively. Resources for Seniors is the lead agency for Weatherization Assistance in Wake and Durham counties. Eligibility is determined by gross annual household income. Eligible homeowners receive services free of charge. In some circumstances work can be done on a rented home (with the landlord's permission and agreement to pay partial costs if applicable). Weatherization starts with an "energy audit" of the home to see where air is leaking (through ducts, walls, floors, attic, etc.). Auditors then determine the best way to seal up any leaks, to keep conditioned air inside the home where it belongs. Methods include adding insulation and sealing and insulating ducts. The home's heating and cooling system (HVAC) is evaluated, cleaned, and tuned to see if it is working efficiently. In some cases, the HVAC system may be repaired or replaced.

While there is no financial cost for Weatherization, there is a time commitment. Homeowners need to be available for six to eight scheduled visits from staff, contractors and building code officials.

This is not a home repair program. Homes in need of major repairs will be deferred from the Weatherization Assistance Program. If your home is in need of repairs, see page 41-42 or call Resources for Seniors for information on home repair programs.

Property Tax Relief Programs

North Carolina offers three property tax relief programs for the permanent residence of qualified homeowners. Call the Department of Tax Administration for more information.

• Elderly or Disabled Exclusion (a.k.a. Homestead Exclusion): a yearly exemption that excludes from taxation the first \$25,000 or 50% (whichever is greater) of assessed value for the permanent residence.



Eligible households must include a member who is age 65 or older or disabled, and have a combined income of \$31,500* or less.

- Circuit Breaker Tax Deferment Program: an exemption that homeowners must reapply for each year, where taxes are limited to a percentage of the owner's income (taxes above the limit are deferred). Eligible households must include a member who is age 65 or older or disabled, and have a combined income of \$47,250* or less.
- **Disabled Veteran Exclusion**: a yearly exemption that excludes from taxation the first \$45,000 of assessed value for the permanent residence. Eligible households must include an honorably discharged veteran with a disability, or the unmarried surviving spouse of one. Not based on age or income.

LEGAL SERVICES

An **elder law attorney** specializes in assisting older adults and their families with legal issues common to aging, such as estate planning, public benefits for long-term care, and incompetency (guardianship) proceedings. **Estate planning** includes the preparation of wills, trusts, and powers of attorney.

Advance directives are documents such as living wills and health care powers of attorney that specify your wishes related to health care in the event that you are unable to speak for yourself. You can enlist the expertise of an attorney to complete advance directive documents. You can also complete many advance directive documents on your own, using templates found online, as long as the signing of the completed forms is witnessed by a notary. See Medical Care Decisions & Advance Directives on page 82 for more information.

A power of attorney is a legal document giving someone else, who is called your "agent," or "attorney-infact," the power to act on your behalf in certain circumstances. A durable general power of attorney is one that grants broad powers to your agent and stays in effect even if you become incompetent. A person who is already incompetent cannot grant a power of attorney, so it is important to have everything in place before you need it. A power of attorney gives your agent the "power to" do things that you would choose to do yourself, not "power over" you. As long as you remain competent you can overrule your agent's decisions, revoke the power of attorney, or give the power to a different person.

Guardianship is a legal proceeding by which a person can be declared incompetent to manage their own affairs. A representative is appointed to make decisions on the person's behalf. A guardian, unlike a person who holds a power of attorney, can overrule a person's decisions if necessary to care for the person's needs. Guardianship petition forms are available to the public (see the Guardianship listing below), but many people benefit from consulting an attorney for this process.

Representative Payee is a special designation used by the Social Security Administration to refer to a person who is receiving Social Security payments on behalf of someone else who is unable to manage their own funds. It is more than a power of attorney and less than guardianship, and applies only to Social Security. The Social Security Administration does not accept regular power of attorney for this purpose. For more information go online to www.ssa.gov/payee or call 1-800-772-1213. There is now also the option to make



an Advance Designation of up to three individuals who could serve as a representative payee if the need arises (see www.ssa.gov/payee/advance_designation.htm for more information).

LONG-TERM CARE

If you feel that a loved one's safety or health is at risk if they remain living at home, consult with their doctor about whether a long-term care facility may be appropriate. Before beginning to evaluate facilities, you will need to know the level of care that is needed. The official form filled out by a physician to indicate this is called an **FL-2**.

Types of Long-Term Care

There are two basic types of long-term care facilities, corresponding to different levels of care:

- Skilled care: Skilled nursing facilities, also called nursing homes or rehabilitation (rehab) centers, are appropriate when an individual needs ongoing nursing intervention (following an illness, or for chronic conditions) or short-term intensive physical therapy, occupational therapy, or speech therapy. Patients need skilled medical care, but do not require hospital care. Care is provided under the direction of a physician.
- Assisted living: Licensed as "adult care" in North Carolina, an assisted living level of care is appropriate for individuals who do not need skilled medical care but cannot live alone, and consists of room and board, activities, administration of medications, medical transportation, assistance with personal hygiene, and 24-hour supervision. Care can be provided in adult care homes, which are licensed for seven or more residents, or family care homes, which are licensed or 2-6 residents. Some skilled care facilities and retirement communities also have adult care (assisted living) sections.

Choosing a Long-Term Care Facility

Paying for Long-Term Care

Long-term care can be extremely costly. In Wake County, assisted living costs can range from around \$4,000 per month to over \$8,500 per month. Skilled care facility costs can start at over \$7,000 per month.

Medicare

• It is a common misconception that Medicare covers most of the cost of long-term care. Medicare pays for less than 2% of skilled care, limited to short-term stays after an individual meets strict criteria including prior hospitalization, and Medicare does not pay for assisted living care under any circumstances.

Medicaid

Medicaid rules are complex. It is a good idea to get information from a Medicaid specialist before money and assets are depleted, and before considering any transfers of assets.

• Long Term Care Medicaid: The cost of skilled care can be covered by Long Term Care Medicaid, also called "Nursing Home Medicaid," for many people who have exhausted their personal resources. To be eligible an individual must meet age and disability criteria as well as income and

resource (asset) limits. The eligibility requirements for receiving Medicaid in a nursing home are different from the Medicaid requirements for community-dwelling adults; many people not eligible for Medicaid when living at home become eligible when they enter a nursing home. • Special Assistance: The cost of assisted living can be covered not by Medicaid directly, because it is not considered a medical service, but under a state/county program called Special Assistance. To be eligible an individual must meet age and disability criteria as well as very strict income and resource (asset) limits. An applicant whose income is too high is ineligible even if they cannot afford to pay privately for care. If eligible, Special Assistance pays for room and board costs, after the resident's own income has been applied (individuals keep a very small amount of their income), and the resident also receives Medicaid to cover the cost of medical care and prescription medications. MEDICAL SUPPLIES AND EQUIPMENT

There are many types of assistive products, equipment, and supplies that can help make daily living easier for seniors and adults with disabilities, such as mobility equipment (e.g. wheelchairs, walkers, canes, crutches, and scooters) and home safety equipment (e.g. hospital beds, commode chairs, and patient lifts). The term **Durable Medical Equipment (DME)** refers to items that can withstand repeated use, are used for a medical reason, are used in the home, and generally have an expected lifetime of at least 3 years.

Medicare Part B (Medical Insurance) covers some DME if it is prescribed by a doctor. The item(s) must be medically necessary and purchased from a Medicare-enrolled supplier.

Before buying or renting any medical equipment you should ask if the supplier "accepts assignment" from Medicare. If they do, they have agreed to Medicare's reimbursement rates and there is a limit on what you can be charged. Medicare will typically pay 80% of the cost of approved items; you will pay 20%. For example, if Medicare has approved a cost of \$100 for an item, the supplier cannot charge more than that. Medicare would pay \$80 and you would pay \$20. The supplier is responsible for billing Medicare for the remainder.

Some medical equipment suppliers do not accept assignment. This means they can charge more than Medicare's approved amount, and you may have to pay the difference. For example, if Medicare approves an item at \$100, but the supplier charges \$150, you would pay \$20 (20% of Medicare's approved amount) plus \$50; the item would cost you \$70 instead of \$20. Suppliers that do not accept assignment can also ask you to pay in full and then wait for reimbursement from Medicare.



In addition to most of the listings below, many chain drugstores, discount stores, and some grocery stores are also Medicare-enrolled DME suppliers, including CVS, Harris Teeter, Kmart, Target, Walmart, and Walgreens. To find a supplier of a specific item, use the Medicare DME Supplier Directory resource listed below or call Medicare at 800-633-4227.

The Medicare Durable Medical Equipment, Prosthetics, Orthotics & Supplies (DMEPOS) Competitive Bidding Program resumed January 1,2021 but only for two product categories: off-the-shelf back braces and off-the-shelf knee braces. If you need these products, get them from a contracted supplier in order to have them covered by Medicare. Personal Emergency Response Systems

Personal Emergency Response Systems (PERS), also known as medical alert systems, can be valuable for seniors and adults with disabilities who are at risk of falling or having a medical emergency. Each system is different, but most consist of a button that can be worn as a pendant around the neck or on a wristband. Pressing the button sends a signal to a monitoring center; the monitor contacts designated responders (which can include family members, neighbors, 911, etc.) as needed, and typically maintains contact with the subscriber until help arrives. Some systems are unmonitored.

Landline service is traditional, but many companies now offer cellular service (for those without a landline), or even mobile capabilities (allowing use outside of the home). Some systems offer add-on features, such as automatic fall detection or medication reminder calls. Costs can vary widely.

These services are typically not covered by Medicare or other insurance. Compare costs and services prior to purchasing a device or signing a contract. Consumer Reports (www.consumerreports.org) offers reviews of many national options.

MEDICARE, MEDICAID, AND HEALTH INSURANCE

Medicare is the federal medical insurance program for US citizens ages 65 and older who are eligible for Social Security benefits, and for some younger adults with disabilities. It is administered by the US Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS). The Social Security Administration (SSA) handles Medicare enrollment and provides information. The Seniors' Health Insurance Information Program (SHIIP) is part of the NC Department of Insurance and is a resource for information and counseling about Medicare plans, and



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more, in North Carolina. If you have questions about Medicare options, see the SHIIP listing on *page 59* for contact information.

Any provider accepting Medicare patients must be Medicare-approved to provide the service. They must also file the Medicare claims for the patient. This includes physicians, hospitals, durable medical equipment suppliers, home health agencies, and other Medicare-approved providers.

Traditional Medicare has three parts for most people: Part A, Part B, and Part D.

- Medicare Part A (Hospital Insurance) is free to most recipients and covers inpatient hospital services, limited skilled nursing services, limited home health care, and hospice services. There is a deductible and coinsurance for the hospital and skilled nursing benefits.
- Medicare Part B (Medical Insurance) covers physicians' services, outpatient hospital services, medical tests, durable medical equipment, and some other services not covered under Part A. Part B is optional and requires a monthly premium (usually deducted from a recipient's Social Security check), a yearly deductible, and copayments. Traditionally, eyeglasses, hearing aids, and dental care are not covered.
- Medicare Part D (Prescription Drug Insurance) covers outpatient prescription medications. Part D is optional and requires a monthly premium. Recipients select from among a large number of plans offered by private insurers. Assistance with premiums is available for low-income recipients. See page 60.

Medicare Supplemental Insurance, or Medigap, is insurance to supplement traditional Medicare coverage. Medigap plans are sold by many insurance companies and are regulated by state and federal laws. There are ten standard Medigap plans, which makes it easier for consumers to compare different companies' products and costs. For more information on Medicare Supplemental Insurance options contact SHIIP.

Medicare Advantage Plans, sometimes referred to as "Medicare Part C," are private plans designed as an alternative to traditional Medicare coverage. Advantage Plans are required to offer the same coverage as standard Medicare, but may do so with a different approach to copayments and coinsurance. In some plans participants simply continue to pay their normal Medicare Part B premium each month, while in other cases there is an additional premium. Participants must be covered by Medicare Part A and B in order to sign up for a Medicare Advantage plan. Some Medicare Advantage Plans may offer additional benefits not covered by traditional Medicare, such as vision, dental, and hearing coverage, but this varies by plan. Most Advantage plans have a limited network of providers, though some plans also offer out-of-network coverage at a higher copayment. Be sure to check that your preferred doctors are in-network and will accept the reimbursements offered by a plan you're considering before signing up. Medicare Advantage plans may not be used in combination with a supplemental policy or a separate Medicare Part D plan. Most Medicare Advantage plans include drug coverage, but a few do not. For more information on Medicare Advantage Plans see www.medicare.gov or contact SHIIP.

Medicare Savings programs (also called MQB or Medicare-Aid) can help pay Medicare premiums, and in some cases copayments and deductibles, for applicants that qualify based on income. See the Adult Medicaid listing on *page 59* for how to apply. Generally, if you have income at or below \$1,449 per month and assets at or below \$7,970, for a 1-person household*, or income at or below \$1,960 per month and assets at or below \$11,960 for a 2-person household,* you would likely qualify (there are lower limits for assistance with copayments).

Medicaid is a state/federal program for people with low income that pays for a range of health care needs including hospital costs, physician care, and some in-home care, dental care, and intermediate/skilled nursing care. For Medicare recipients, Medicaid acts as a supplemental policy, covering the premiums, copays, coinsurance, and deductibles that would otherwise be the patient's responsibility. Recipients must meet very strict income and asset guidelines. People who have Medicaid do not need to purchase additional Medigap insurance or sign up for a Medicare Advantage plan, but they do need to select a

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Medicare Part D drug plan (or one will be selected for them). See the Adult Medicaid listing on *page 59* for how to apply. Generally, to be eligible for full community living NC Medicaid you must have income at or below \$1,074 per month and assets at or below \$2,000, for a 1-person household*, or income at or below \$1,452 per month and assets at or below \$3,000 for a 2-person household* (keep in mind that there are different types of Medicaid that have differing eligibility requirements; for more information contact the Adult Medicaid office at Wake County Human Services).*Limits may have changed



PRESCRIPTION DRUGS

Medicare Part D

Medicare Part D is a prescription drug benefit that is a voluntary add-on to Medicare. Participants select from among a large number of different plans offered by private insurers. Plans vary widely in their premiums, copays and coinsurance; they also have different formularies (lists of approved drugs). Some plans have yearly deductibles (up to \$445*), and most feature a coverage gap or "donut hole." The coverage gap begins after an individual and their drug plan have spent \$4,130* on covered drugs. Once in the coverage gap, further benefits are stopped or limited until the person has incurred \$6,550* in out-of-pocket drug costs. Once this point is reached they are out of the coverage gap and catastrophic coverage is available under all plans, reducing their portion to a small coinsurance amount or copayment for covered drugs for the rest of the year. During the coverage gap, an individual will pay up to 25% of their plan's cost for covered brand-name drugs and generic drugs. Some plans may offer higher savings in the coverage gap.

People who have relatively low income and assets may be eligible for Extra Help, also called the Low Income Subsidy (LIS), which pays for some or all of the prescription costs, premiums, deductibles, and coinsurance of Medicare prescription drug coverage, and eliminates the coverage gap. To qualify for Extra Help, individuals must have income at or below \$1,630 per month and assets at or below \$14,790*; married couples must have income at or below \$2,198 per month and assets at or below \$29,520. *The value of a home, one car, personal property, and a small burial account are excluded. People with SSI, Medicaid, or Medicare Savings are automatically enrolled in Extra Help. For others, the application is very easy and can be done online. Go to: www.ssa.gov/benefits/medicare/prescriptionhelp.

Information for comparing Medicare Part D plans is available at www.medicare.gov, and the Seniors' Health Insurance Information Program (SHIIP) provides free, objective, one-on-one assistance (they do not recommend or promote any specific plan or company, but use the tools provided by Medicare to assist consumers in finding the best plan to meet their individual needs).

Medication Therapy Management

Medication Therapy Management involves consultation with a pharmacist to review an individual's medications. This can be a chance to learn about possible harmful interactions, side effects, and duplications, and to identify other medications that may be less costly or more effective, as well as to ensure that the individual understands the purposes of their medications and how to take them correctly. The pharmacist then confers with the individual's doctor regarding any proposed changes. This service is offered by Resources for Seniors Pharmacy Department as well as by some pharmacies and specialty providers.

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SOCIAL SECURITY

Individuals become eligible for **Social Security** (**retirement benefits**) based on their employment history. Benefits are available to all workers who have met minimum employment criteria, or who qualify based on someone else's record (such as a spouse), and are calculated based on the highest 35 years of earnings in an individual's employment record. Full retirement age depends on date of birth. For people born before 1937, normal retirement age is 65. For those born between 1937 and 1959, the full retirement age transitions upward from 65 toward 67. Individuals born from 1960 on will reach full retirement age at 67. Regardless of birthdate, all individuals may elect to begin receiving Social Security benefits at the early retirement age of 62, or may delay receiving benefits up to age 70. Choosing early retirement will mean a permanent 20%–30% reduction in benefits, while delaying retirement can result in a higher monthly benefit amount for each month of delay.

The Social Security Administration (SSA) website, www.ssa.gov, has a variety of benefit and retirement planning calculators to assist with making decisions about when to begin receiving benefits, as well as an online benefits application.

Individuals who become disabled before retirement age may qualify for disability income benefits under the **Social Security Disability (SSDI or SSD)** program. These applications can be initiated online at www.ssa.gov.

Supplemental Security Income (SSI) is a needs-based program, in contrast to regular Social Security. It is meant to provide a minimum amount of monthly income (\$794 per month for an individual or \$1,191 per month for a married couple*). Eligibility for SSI is based on assets and income, not amount of time worked. For older adults, SSI supplements regular Social Security for those who would otherwise have an extremely low monthly Social Security benefit. SSI may also be available to those who are disabled in childhood or before they were able to establish a work record that would qualify them for regular Social Security. SSI recipients must be 65 years of age or older, or disabled or blind, in addition to having extremely low income and resources.



VETERANS SERVICES

Veterans seeking disability or other benefits from the **Veteran's Administration (VA)** may apply online at **www.ebenefits.va.gov**, seek assistance from a **Veterans Service Organization (VSO)**, or retain a VA-accredited claims agent or attorney. VSOs offer free assistance; attorneys and claims agents charge fees, but may not charge until the VA has rendered a decision on an application.

Benefits that older adult veterans, disabled adult veterans, or their caregivers may qualify for include:

- Aid and Attendance: For qualifying veterans who require the aid of another person in order to perform activities of daily living, are bedridden, are a patient in a nursing home, or are visually impaired.
- Housebound: For qualifying veterans who have a permanent disability (rated 100 percent disabled) and need assistance, or have a permanent disability (rated 100 percent disabled) and one or more other disabilities (rated 60 percent or more disabled).
- Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers (PCAFC): This program was expanded in 2020. Now caregivers of veterans who incurred or aggravated a serious injury in the line of duty on or before May 7,1975, or on or after September 11,2001, can apply for support benefits including a financial stipend. Call the VA Caregiver Support Line, 855–260–3274, for more information.
- VA Disability Pension Benefit: For qualifying wartime veterans who have limited or no income and are age 65 or older, permanently and totally disabled, a patient in a nursing home, or receiving Social Security disability payments. Contact aVSO office orVA-accredited claims agent or attorney for more information.

ASSESSING NEEDS

If you have aging or disabled relatives, friends, or neighbors, and find yourself wondering if they need support or services, here are some things to look for to help you determine if help is needed. For many of these questions, all you have to do is keep your eyes open. Other issues, like money management, may require more careful and tactful questioning. In general, you are looking for signs of change from past behavior.

Driving:

Driving skill can be an early casualty due to vision loss, early-stage dementia, or other neurological problems that impair concentration.

- Look at the car. Are there any recent dents or scrapes?
- Let them drive somewhere that is familiar to them and ride along. Do you feel safe? Any close calls or unusual variations in speed? Any signs of confusion about where to go?

Mail:

A casual glance around the home can be very telling in terms of lost organizational skills or possible depression or anxiety that results in avoidance.

- Is there a stack (or many stacks) of unsorted mail?
- Are bills and other important correspondence mixed in with outdated junk mail?
- Are there an unusual number of sweepstakes entry forms or charitable or political solicitation letters? (This can be a sign that an older adult is being taken in by fraudulent or deceptive marketing, or has been responding to telephone solicitations.)

Paying bills and managing money:

These things can be harder to determine without asking prying questions or looking at bank statements, but you may see evidence or hear stories about services getting cut off, or hassles with the bank.

- Are the utility bills getting paid on time? What about rent or mortgage payments?
- Is the checkbook balanced? Are there signs of overdrafts?
- Are there a lot of credit card bills? Are payments being made?
- Are there questionable charges on any statements?

Housekeeping:

Look for changes from past behavior - what was normal for this person in the past?

- Is the home reasonably clean? Have there been major changes in the level of cleanliness?
- Are there strong odors in the home?
- Is laundry getting done regularly? Do their bedsheets seem clean?
- Is the home cluttered? Are there safety hazards due to walkways being blocked?

Meal preparation and nutrition:

Appetite can change with age and activity level, and changes in the way things taste or smell are also quite common in older adults. Sometimes this can be an early sign of a more serious medical problem, or may result in a problem if it leads to not eating regularly. Physical limitations such as back pain can reduce the ability to stand long enough to prepare food; loneliness or depression can take away the desire to prepare nutritionally varied meals.

- Are they eating regular meals? Do they appear to have lost weight recently?
- Any signs of loss of appetite or changes in taste or smell (picking at food; only eating a few foods)?
- Are they able to prepare food for themselves?

assessing needs

- Is there a reasonable amount and variety of food in the refrigerator and cupboards?
- · Any signs of rotten food, or unusual overstocking of certain items?

Personal care:

Changes in dress or personal grooming can also reflect a variety of issues. Perhaps arthritis makes it difficult to put on some kinds of clothing. Wearing the same clothes over and over may also indicate depression or other problems.

- Does the person appear well-groomed and appropriately dressed? Are their clothes clean?
- Do they change clothes regularly, or do they always seem to be wearing the same thing?
- Does she or he seem to be bathing regularly?
- Can she or he get in and out of the tub or shower without assistance?
- Are there stains or odors that might indicate difficulty getting to the bathroom?
- If there are prescription medications, does the person seem to be taking them regularly? Does she or he have a system for remembering when to take them?

Changes in social behavior:

If there have been changes in this area, the question is, "why?" Is transportation a problem? Does the person hesitate to go to social gatherings because hearing loss makes conversation difficult? Or are they withdrawing from the world because of grief or depression?

- Do they still see friends and participate in social activities? If not, why? Do they seem lonely or isolated?
- If they went to church previously, do they still go?

Mental status:

These are just a few indicators that there may be a problem with depression or possibly a neurological disorder. Remember that there may be many explanations for these behaviors, some of which are quite treatable, so don't assume "it's just old age." Not all older adults are miserable, focused on death, or living in the past.

- Have they lost interest in things they used to enjoy?
- Do they seem unusually worried, hopeless, or sad?
- Do they repeat questions or stories over and over?
- Do you have to repeat or explain things multiple times to get them to understand?
- Are they able to recall recent events accurately?
- Do they have difficulty concentrating on a conversation, book, or television program?
- Do they seem unusually sleepy during the day? Do they have a regular sleep schedule?
- Do they seem uncharacteristically angry or suspicious?
- Do they complain about items being lost or stolen?

If you notice a problem:

- Talk about it. Discuss your concerns with the person. Do your best to do this in a tactful, non-judgmental way. Do your best to not over-react, and to listen to their view of the situation.
- Seek more information. Depending on what you hear, you may also want to talk to other family members, close friends, or the peron's physician to get more context, information, and/or suggestions.
- **Don't panic!** Remember, there could be a variety of explanations for many of these problems, including loss of mobility, physical limitations, chronic pain, vision or other sensory losses, confusion due to medication problems, depression, and possibly dementia. Help may be needed, but the person could still be able to continue living independently once problems are identified and supports are put in place.



MOVING TO NORTH CAROLINA Tips for Seniors (and Loved Ones of Aging Adults)

There are many issues to consider before deciding to move to North Carolina from another state. Here are a few of the most important. For more information on what resources are available in Wake County, call Resources for Seniors.

Financial resources:

Before planning a move, it is important to take stock of financial resources, and, especially, whether you are (your loved one is) currently receiving any public benefits that are based on income. **Public benefits** can vary from state to state - what is available elsewhere may not be available in North Carolina. It is a good idea to have a detailed understanding of:

- Income (Social Security, pensions, etc.)
- Assets (savings, investments, retirement accounts, etc.)
- Public assistance, if any (Medicaid, food assistance, prescription drug assistance, utility bill assistance, home care assistance, etc.)

Social Security:

Social Security is a federal benefit so does not change state-to-state, but the Social Security Administration must be notified of a change of address and you (your loved one) must arrange for payments to be direct-deposited into a new bank. This is not difficult and can usually be arranged by filling out a form at the new bank, but it does require the signature of the beneficiary.

Medicare and prescription drug coverage:

The basic Medicare benefit will not change, but consider:

- Are you (is your loved one) enrolled in a Medicare Advantage plan? Medicare Advantage plans are private plans and typically serve a specific region, so may not be transferrable to North Carolina.
- Do you (does your loved one) have a "Medigap" or supplemental insurance policy? If so, check to see if the same policy is available in North Carolina. If not, don't drop the old policy until a new one is in place!
- Are you (is your loved one) enrolled in Medicare Part D? Some Part D prescription drug plans are nationwide, while others only serve specific regions. Check to see if the same plan is available in North Carolina, and if not, if a similar plan is available.
- Are you (is your loved one) enrolled in a State Pharmaceutical Assistance Program (SPAP)? North Carolina only has a minimal SPAP. If assistance is not available, could you (could your loved one) still afford their medications?

Medicare doctors:

Finding a primary care doctor who is accepting new Medicare patients is not always easy in Wake County. Start looking as soon as possible (don't leave it until a prescription refill is needed). Try calling larger practices, which often have new doctors coming on staff more often and may have more availability.

Medicaid:

Medicaid (health insurance for people with low income) is funded by a combination of federal and state dollars, so eligibility varies state-to-state. **If you have (if your loved one has) Medicaid now, that does not guarantee you (your loved one) will be eligible in North Carolina.** NC Medicaid eligibility rules are stricter than many other states (see *page 59* for more information about Medicaid).

moving to north carolina

Since Medicaid can be a source of payment for in-home care, prescription drug coverage, and other benefits in addition to direct health care coverage, it can be crucial to determine whether you are (whether your loved one is) receiving these benefits and whether you (they) would still be eligible in North Carolina. In addition, many Medicaid-related programs have lengthy application processes and/or wait lists, so benefits are often not immediate even if an applicant is approved for NC Medicaid.

Food aid and other economic assistance:

If you receive (if your loved one receives) any of the following benefits, check to see if the same benefit is available in North Carolina. Some eligibility limits change state-to-state, or by region:

- Food Assistance (Food Stamps, or SNAP);
- Discounts on utility bills or winter heating costs;
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI) (although this is a federal benefit, some states provide more generous supplements. This is not the case in North Carolina);
- Other economic help from the state or county.

Home care and chore services:

Do you (does your loved one) receive assistance in the home from a home health aide or chore worker? If so, check to see who is paying for this service. Availability of such services is much more limited in North Carolina than elsewhere. If public assistance is not available, how will you (your loved one) fill this need?

Transportation:

Do you (does your loved one) drive? If so, think about if you (they) would be able to easily adjust to driving in a new area. This can be difficult or daunting, even for those who have been easily capable of driving familiar routes in their home area.

If you do not drive (if your loved one does not drive) how will you (they) get around? Public transportation is limited or unavailable in much of Wake County, and private transportation can be costly. Will family or friends be available to take you (them) to medical appointments, the grocery store, etc.?

Social support:

- What kind of social support network do you (does your loved one) have at home now? A church community, neighbors, friends, and family can relieve isolation and provide back-up in times of crisis. If you move here (if your loved one moves here), what source(s) of social support would be available?
- How easily do you (does your loved one) make new friends?
- If there are friends or family in North Carolina that you are (your loved one is) moving to be close to, how busy are those people with their own families, jobs, and social activities?
- What will you (will your loved one) lose by moving here? Is it outweighed by what would be gained?
 Especially if you are (if your loved one is) frail, it may be difficult or impossible to rebuild a social network in a new place.

Housing:

- What kind of living situation are you (is your loved one) in now? Will a similar situation be available in North Carolina? Be aware that there are long waitlists for affordable housing in Wake County.
- Will you (will your loved one) be able to continue at the same level of independence, or, upon moving, will additional support be needed? If you need (if your loved one needs) a long-term care setting such as assisted living or skilled nursing care, be sure to look into how that would be paid for. The same level of financial support for long-term care may not be available in North Carolina as in other states.



Why are you considering this move?

Be sure to think through your reasons for this move, if it's your idea. If the idea is coming from someone else, ask for clarification to understand why that person wants you (wants your loved one) to move.

- Are you (is your loved one) reacting to an acute situation such as an illness or fall? If so, think about if a move is the best solution to the situation:
 - Could a less drastic solution, such as a personal emergency response system (medical alert), or a
 few hours per week of in-home services, provide additional security or peace of mind to solve the
 immediate problem?
 - Will a move really solve the problem? E.g., will moving prevent future falls?
- Whose needs are being met by the move? You may feel more secure if you are (if your loved one is) nearer to family, but what may be lost in exchange for that security?
- What do you (what does your loved one) think about this move? Take time to really listen.

Carefully consider both what is important <u>to</u> you (to your loved one) and what is important <u>for</u> you (for your loved one). The bottom line should be: What decision will contribute most to your (to your loved one's) quality of life?

Before Calling

Before contacting agencies, think about what you and your loved one(s) need and want from a potential home care service:

- How does she/he plan to pay for the service? Keep in mind that it is a common misconception that
 Medicare covers the cost of home care services. Most home care services are not considered a medical service, so are not covered by Medicare. For more information see "Paying for Home Care" on
 page 25.
- What does she/he want or need help with? (Bathing, dressing, housekeeping, meal preparation, grocery shopping, transportation, companionship, etc.? Does the person require "hands-on" care, or just supervision? Do they require any skilled services, such as physical therapy or nursing?) It is important to understand the limitations of the services you are requesting, e.g., a home care aide is typically not permitted to directly administer medications or give injections, though they can remind a patient to take medications that have been dispensed into a pillbox; some agencies allow aides to provide transportation, while others do not; home care aides can typically help with "light housekeeping" but not heavy-duty cleaning.
- When does she/he want an aide to come? (How often, what days, for how many hours per visit, etc.; Is this a short-term or a long-term need? How flexible are they about scheduling? How soon does service need to start?)
- Does she/he have any special needs or requests? (Male aide; strong aide for lifting; aide who has worked with dementia patients; non-smoker; OK with pets; able to provide transportation; etc.)

Gathering Information

When contacting agencies, consider asking these questions:

- Payment: If she/he will be paying privately, what are the basic hourly charges? Are there overtime charges, or higher charges for evening or weekend coverage? What is the minimum number of hours per visit? Do they charge for the initial assessment? If yes, how much? If Medicare is to be used for services, is the agency Medicare-certified? Is a physician referral required? If private insurance or another payment method may be used, do they accept the payment source? Will they file insurance claims, or require the client/family to?
- **Services:** Do they offer the kinds of services that are needed? Can they meet her/his special needs or requests?
- Hours: What hours of the day are they available? When would they be able to start?
- Coverage: Can they provide services on holidays if needed? Will the same person provide service at each visit? What happens if an aide is sick or goes on vacation?
- Licensing and experience: How many years have they been in business? Are they licensed by the Division of Health Services Regulation? Are they accredited?
- Aides: How do they screen their job applicants (what kind of training or certification is required)? Do they perform staff background checks? Are workers employees or independent contractors of the agency? What kind of training do they provide to their workers?
- **Insurance**: Do they have liability insurance (covers damage to the home or injury to the patient)? Are their workers bonded (covers employee theft or dishonesty)? Do they have workers compensation insurance (covers injury to the worker on the job)?
- Ask for references.



CHOOSING A LONG-TERM CARE FACILITY

When visiting facilities, consider the following:

First impressions:

- Do you like the facility's outward appearance?
- Is the location convenient for visits by family and friends?
- Is the residence clean and free of odors?
- Is the facility appropriately heated/cooled?
- What is the noise level in the facility?
- Do staff address residents by their names and interact with them during your tour?
- Do you notice the residents socializing with each other and do they appear content?
- Can you talk with residents about how they like living there and what they think of staff? What do they say?
- Are staff courteous to residents and to each other?
- Do staff respond to requests for assistance in a timely manner?
- · Are visits with residents encouraged and welcome at any time?
- Is the floor plan of the common areas well-designed and easy to follow?

Living area and accommodations:

- How many units are there, and how many are occupied?
- Are there different sizes and types of units available with optional floor plans?
- Are single units available? Are double occupancy units available for sharing with another person?
- What furniture is provided and what can residents bring from home?
- May residents decorate their own rooms?
- Is there adequate storage space in the individual units?
- Are the common areas attractive, comfortable and clean?
- Is there an outside courtyard or patio for residents and visitors?
- What laundry services or facilities are available for residents' personal clothing?

Safety and accessibility:

- Are doorways, hallways and rooms accessible for wheelchairs and walkers?
- Are bathrooms accessible for wheelchairs and walkers?
- Are elevators available for those unable to use stairways?
- · Are there handrails in the hallways to aid in walking?
- Are floors of a non-skid material and carpets conducive to safe walking?
- Does the residence have good lighting, sprinklers and clearly-marked exits?
- Does the residence provide ample security and is there an emergency evacuation plan?
- Is a 24-hour emergency response system installed in each unit? What happens when it is activated?

Services:

- What services are available to all residents at the base rate?
- Are there additional charges for personal care services (help with bathing, dressing, etc.)? Who provides these services and what are their qualifications?
- Are housekeeping, linen service and personal laundry included in the fees, or are they available at an additional charge?
- Does the facility offer any special services or areas for dementia patients? How do these services differ? Is there an additional charge for these?

choosing a long-term care facility

- To what extent are medical services available within the facility, and how are these services provided?
- How are medical emergencies handled? Does the facility have a clearly-stated procedure for responding to medical emergencies? Is there an arrangement with a nearby hospital?
- Are there staff that coordinate visits from a nurse, physical or occupational therapist, etc., when needed on a temporary basis?
- Does the facility provide transportation to doctors' offices, the hairdresser, shopping, and other activities desired by residents? If so, how is that arranged?
- · Are pharmacy, barber/beautician, physical therapy, or any other services offered on-site or nearby?

Social and recreational activities:

- What kinds of group/individual recreational activities, if any, are offered? Who schedules/coordinates them? Can you meet that person?
- Is there an organized activities program with a posted daily schedule of events?
- Does the facility schedule trips or other events off-premises?
- · Are the social and activity areas appropriate and desirable to the prospective resident?
- Are there supplies for social activities/hobbies (games, cards, crafts, computers, gardening supplies)?
- Are religious services held on the premises or are arrangements made for residents to attend nearby services?
- Are there fitness facilities? What about regularly-scheduled exercise classes?
- Are residents' pets allowed? Does the facility have pets, and if so who cares for them?

Food:

- Does the residence provide meals? If so, how many times a day, how many days a week, and how does the menu vary from meal to meal? Can you look at a menu?
- Can special diets be accommodated? Does a qualified dietitian plan or approve menus?
- Are residents involved in menu planning and may they request specific foods?
- Does the dining room environment encourage residents to relax, socialize, and enjoy their food?
- May residents eat meals in their units? May they keep snacks or other food in their units?
- Are meals provided only at set times or is there some flexibility? Are snacks available?
- Can residents have guests dine with them for an additional fee? Is there a private dining room for special events and occasions, if desired?
- · Can you tour the facility during a meal and eat with the residents?
- What do residents say about the food?

Moving in, contracts, and finances:

- Is there a waiting list? If so, how long do they estimate it will be until a unit becomes available?
- What is involved with the moving in/out process?
- Is there a written statement of residents' rights and responsibilities? Can you take home a copy?
- Does the contract clearly disclose all fees for healthcare, accommodations, personal care, supportive services, as well as admission and discharge provisions?
- How much is the monthly fee? What does this include?
- How often can fees be increased and for what reasons? Is there a limit on the amount of increase per year? What is the history of monthly fee increases?
- Are residents required to purchase renters' insurance for personal property in their units?
- Do billing, payment and credit policies seem fair and reasonable?
- Is prepayment, a deposit, or an entrance fee required? Is any of that refundable?
- May the resident handle her/his own finances with staff assistance, if able, or must a family member/ outside party be designated?



- Is the contract for a specific period of time or month-to-month?
- When may a contract be terminated and what are the policies for refunds and transfers?
- What happens if funds are depleted and full payment can no longer be made?
- Does the facility accept Medicaid? What about Special Assistance?
- What additional services are available if the resident's needs change? Are staff available to coordinate these services?
- Is there a procedure to pay for additional services such as skilled nursing care or physical therapy when the services are needed on a temporary basis?
- Under what circumstances would the resident be forced to move out (because of increased care needs, change in finances, etc.)?
- What happens if the resident needs to be hospitalized temporarily? How long can the facility hold a room for the resident, and what would it cost to do that?

Staff:

- · What are the hiring procedures and requirements for eligibility?
- Are criminal background checks, references, and certifications required?
- Is there a staff training program in place and what does it entail?
- What is the staff turnover rate for patient care aides? What does the facility do to encourage staff to stay?
- How long has the current administrator been there?
- What is the staff-to-patient ratio during the day? At night? On weekends?
- Does the facility have RNs on duty at all times? LPNs?

Licensure and certification:

- Does the facility have a current license displayed?
- If the state requires the administrator to be licensed/certified, does she/he have a current license?
- What reputation does the facility have in the community?

Complaints and problem-solving:

- Is the administrator, or other appropriate staff person, generally available to answer questions or discuss problems and would you be comfortable dealing with them on a regular basis?
- Is there a resident council or organization through which residents have a means of voicing their views?
- What is the procedure for handling resident or family concerns?
- Is there an appeals process for dissatisfied residents?
- Has the facility experienced any complaints or corrective actions? Are they willing to discuss past problems and how they were resolved?
- Has the facility ever been sanctioned or fined, or had its Medicare/Medicaid certification suspended?

MEDICAL CARE DECISIONS & ADVANCE DIRECTIVES What You Should Know

If you are 18 or older and have the capacity to make and communicate decisions, you have the right to make decisions about your health and mental health treatment. You should talk to your doctor or other health care provider about any treatment or procedure so that you understand what will be done and why. You have the right to say yes or no to treatments recommended by your doctor or mental health provider. If you want to control decisions about your health or mental health care even if you become unable to express yourself, you will need an "advance directive."

What is an advance directive?

An advance directive is a set of directions you give about the health care and/or mental health care you want if you ever lose the ability to make decisions for yourself. North Carolina has three ways for you to make a formal advance directive. One way is called a **living will**, the second is called a **health care power of attorney**, and the third is called an **advance instruction for mental health treatment**.

Do I have to have an advance directive and what happens if I don't?

Making a living will, health care power of attorney, or advance instruction for mental health treatment is your choice. If you become unable to make your own decisions and you have no advance directives in place, your doctor or mental health care provider will consult with someone close to you about your care. Having advance directives makes this easier since you have made your wishes known ahead of time.

What is a living will?

In North Carolina, a living will or "Advance Directive for a Natural Death" is a document that tells others that you want to die a natural death if you are terminally and incurably sick, have advanced dementia, or are unconscious and not expected to wake up. In a living will, you can direct your doctor not to use "life-prolonging measures" such as tube-feeding. You can also say whether your health care agent is allowed to override your instructions or not.

What is a health care power of attorney?

In North Carolina, you can name a person to make health care/mental health care decisions for you if you later become unable to decide yourself, either temporarily or permanently. This person is called your health care agent. The health care power of attorney is a legal document in which you name who you want your agent to be. You can also say what medical treatments/mental health treatments you would want and what you would not want. Your health care agent then knows what choices you would make. Choose an adult you trust, and discuss your wishes with the person before you put them in writing.

What is an advance instruction for mental health treatment?

In North Carolina, an advance instruction for mental health treatment, or psychiatric advance directive, is a legal document that tells doctors and health care providers what mental health treatments you would want and what treatments you would not want, if you later become unable to decide yourself. The designation of a person to make your mental health care decisions, should you be unable to make them yourself, must be established as part of a valid health care power of attorney.

How do I make an advance directive?

You must follow several rules when you make a formal living will, health care power of attorney or an advance instruction for mental health treatment. These rules are to protect you and ensure that your wishes are clear to the person who may be asked to carry them out. The document(s) must be written and signed by you while you are still able to understand your condition and treatment choices and to make those choices known. Two qualified people must witness the signing of the document(s). The living will and the health care power of attorney also must be notarized.

Are there forms I can use to make an advance directive?

Yes. There is a living will form, a health care power of attorney form and an advance instruction for mental health treatment form that you can use. These forms meet all of the rules for a formal advance directive. Using the special form is the best way to make sure that your wishes are carried out. You can obtain these standard forms, free of charge, from a North Carolina state government website (www.sosnc.gov/ahcdr), or you can call Resources for Seniors to request to have a copy mailed to you. Attorneys can also provide these documents, and assist with preparing them (but it is not necessary to hire an attorney to complete these forms).

When does an advance directive go into effect?

A living will goes into effect when you are going to die soon and cannot be cured, when you are unconscious and doctors are sure you won't wake up again, or when you suffer from advanced dementia that cannot be cured. The powers granted by your health care power of attorney go into effect when your doctor states in writing that you are not able to make, or to make known, your health care choices. When you make a health care power of attorney, you can name the doctor or mental health provider you would want to make this decision, or you can leave it up to the doctor who is treating you at the time the decision has to be made. An advance instruction for mental health treatment goes into effect when it is given to your doctor or mental health provider. The doctor will follow the instructions you have put in the document, except in certain situations, after the doctor determines that you are not able to make, and to make known, your choices about mental health treatment. After a doctor determines this, your health care agent may make treatment decisions for you.

What happens if I change my mind?

You can cancel your living will at any time by informing your doctor that you want to cancel it and destroying all the copies of it. You can change your health care power of attorney while you are able to make and make known, your decisions, by signing another one and telling your doctor and each health care agent you named of the change. You can cancel your advance instruction for mental health treatment while you are able to make, and make known, your decisions, by telling your doctor or other provider that you want to cancel it.

Whom should I talk to about an advance directive?

You should talk to those closest to you about an advance directive and your feelings about the care you would like to receive. Having an open conversation with family members about your wishes can save painful confusion and conflict later on. Your doctor or health care provider can answer medical questions. A lawyer can answer questions about the law. Some people also discuss the decision with clergy or other trusted advisors.

Where should I keep my advance directive?

Keep a copy in a safe place where your family can get it, and make sure they know where it is. Give copies to your family, your doctor or other health care/mental health care provider, your health care agent, and any close friends who might be asked about your care should you become unable to make decisions.

What if I have an advance directive from another state?

An advance directive from another state may not meet all of North Carolina's rules. To be safe, you may want to make a new advance directive in North Carolina. Or you could have a North Carolina attorney review the advance directive from the other state.

END OF LIFE PLANNING

The period immediately before and after a death is a very stressful time, with many decisions to be made, and intense feelings. Planning ahead, and discussing your plans with family members, is a great kindness to them and will likely spare them anxiety and conflict at a difficult time. Below are some suggestions about issues to consider and tasks to be completed at various times.

Planning Ahead

Consider your feelings about...

- ...when to stop aggressive medical treatment;
- ...who you can trust to make decisions for you if you are unable to speak for yourself;
- ...whether you wish to donate your body or organs after death;
- ...what kind of funeral arrangements you prefer.

Prepare...

- ...advance directives including a living will and health care power of attorney;
- ...written wishes about funeral arrangements and body disposition;
- ...a will, and select an executor to handle your estate;
- ...written material to help your family locate your important papers and financial information.

Communicate...

- ...your wishes with all the important people in your life (family members, doctors, clergy, etc.) and make sure they are all aware of your wishes, especially if you anticipate conflict among them;
- ...with your health care agent and the executor of your will so they know who they are and what they will be expected to do.

When Death Approaches

- Make sure your advance directives are in the hands of your family, your doctor, and in hospital records;
- Provide your written plans to family and health care providers;
- Remind family where to find important documents and data such as Social Security number, life insurance policies, will, bank account information etc.;
- Write/review obituary, if desired.

After Death

Survivors must:

- ...notify attending physician, hospice, etc., if death does not occur in a hospital;
- ...arrange for completion of death certificate and get multiple copies;
- ...put plans into motion for body/organ donation, if desired;
- ...set date and location for funeral or memorial service;
- ...notify relatives, friends, employers;
- ...assist out-of-town relatives with travel and lodging plans if needed;
- ...publish obituary;
- ...maintain security for home and property if left vacant;
- ...notify Social Security, pension plans, or other sources of benefits;
- ...notify life insurance company;
- ...arrange for administration of estate.
